- Clean air, clean water and abundant wildlife sustain Americans from all walks of life. We all have a shared responsibility to protect these resources for our children's future.
- People of color, indigenous peoples, and low-income communities are at greatest risk of climate change effects.
- These communities are directly affected by living in close proximity to the largest sources of climate change pollution
 - 68 percent of African Americans live within 30 miles of a coal-fired power plant
 - 66 percent of Latinos live in areas that do not meet the federal government's air quality standards

- Cutting back on investments
 - Government fiscal problems may give Congress excuse to cut back on critical investments in renewable energy
