





Engaging the Community in Areas of High Poverty and Under Performing Schools



With students wanting to choice into Beach Court, momentum builds in multiple areas



Beach Court's success in improving school performance has led to more students staying and students outside the region wanting to choice in. It is difficult to measure the impact improved performance has on other programs and resources but it is clear there is a positive feedback loop.

When students leave for other schools, there can be a cascading effect of negative impacts

In Far Northeast 2009, 1/4 of finishing 5th graders (170 of 680) left the areas public school system, either choosing a DPS school in another region or leaving DPS entirely.



When a student leaves the district for another district, DPS looses \$7,626. This is the FY10-11 Total Per Pupil Formula Funding as per the CDE website. If the student stays in the district, but choices into a school outside his home school the average adjustment to the General Fund for the School is about \$4,500.
