Urban Habitat & the Great Communities Collaborative

Regional Planning: Work in communities with a funded planning process around a regionally connected transit station.

Coalitions: Create partnerships with a range of allies with experience in health, land use, transportation, housing, and the environment.

Technical Assistance: Economic Development reports, affordable housing analysis, GIS mapping, transit oriented development tours, etc.

Local Partnerships: Support for local organizations deeply involved with their communities: faith-based organizations, environmental groups, and affordable housing advocates on issues such as Local Hire, Affordable Housing, Transit Access, and Quality Job Development.

Leadership Institutes: Boards and Commission placement/training and panels.

- 1. Policy analysis, development and advocacy
- 2. Capacity building and technical assistance
- 3. Regional coalition building
- 4. Reframing the debate through publications/media.



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



Community Plan Goals

- 1. The RBD is predominantly an area of mixed industrial/business uses, providing for a variety of activities. It is a model for community development with businesses that are based on the job needs of EPA residents.
- 2. The RBD also provides an opportunity for larger community-serving institutions such as a city hospital, school, 1-stop social services, multi-cultural center, theater of arts, after school program, and sports facilities.
- 3. The RBD is a place with uses for youth to learn good things ---> "Da Spot"
- 4. The RBD is a model for new and creative and clean use of contaminated lands.
- 5. The Plan Area is also an opportunity for resident-serving businesses and stores along the adjoining Bay Road corridor and 4-Corners area.
- 6. The Plan Area is an opportunity for community spaces and social gathering and homegrown EPA arts. It is safe, fun, and family-friendly. It is EPA's "downtown."
- 7. The Plan Area has active sidewalks with a variety of businesses, making connections between the RBD, Cooley Landing, Bay Road and the 4-Corners areas.
- 8. The Plan Area has sound infrastructure with an upgraded, undergrounded powerline system.
- 9. The Plan Area has affordable housing for CURRENT East Palo Alto low-income residents.
- 10. The RBD maintains the honest character, quality and priorities of East Palo Alto



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
Complete Community Includes Schools
