


What are your ideas for repurposing underutilized shopping malls?

Sixty years ago the shopping mall emerged as an American institution. Since then, in various permutations, it has become a component of nearly every community in the country. Its form has changed in response to retail and population trends – think lifestyle centers instead of enclosed complexes – and also in response to the economic context.

But what happens to malls when they reach the limits of their first incarnation? In Des Moines, plans for the Southridge Mall revitalization include converting some space into an indoor athletic complex as well as redevelopment to introduce open-air store fronts, a pedestrian plaza, and free-standing commercial properties.

I can get out in nature

Creating new large parks and conservation areas will make it easier for you to get out in nature, since there will be more opportunities in your region.

Conservation areas are places that are especially meant to provide safe, good quality habitat for flora and fauna. Large parks might be equally intended for recreation, sports, and other activities, but if the park is large enough, it can also serve as good habitat for native plants and animals. Smaller parks don't provide adequate habitat for some species, which might need a larger area to thrive, or might need to stay a big distance away from people. Larger parks can serve the needs of people and native flora and fauna, though, and can help keep lowa unique.

My taxes are low

Creating new large parks and conservation areas might require more staff to manage the new areas, and might add other operations and maintenance expenses that are paid for through tax dollars.

Parks and conservation areas also raise property values, adding to the tax base. The cost to create them will also be borne by developers dedicating a portion of their development site—or an equivalent cash amount—to create parks that serve the people who will live in the new developments. In addition, this also means it will cost more to acquire land or obtain new conservation easements.







Utilizing funds they received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to provide capacity building support to regional planning agencies, PlaceMatters has provided Sasaki with partial funding to develop the open source version, called CrowdGauge, with new code and a revamped back end for easier use and deployment.
