

- Membership is comprised of 300 elected officials from 22 local governments, the Maryland and Virginia state legislatures, and U.S. Congress






# Food & Agriculture in the National Capital Region

 COG's 2012 <u>What Our Region</u>
<u>Grows Report</u> found 28% of 8,629 sq mile Washington Agricultural Region in ag land use

- Preserves critical open space, contributes approx \$1 billion/year to economy
- Commodity farming predominates, growing interest and production of a range of other agricultural products, local seafood

"A surge in consumer demand for locallyproduced food is creating jobs and opportunity throughout rural America for farms as well as the small businesses that store, process, market and distribute food locally and regionally. Industry data indicate that local food sales totaled at least \$12 billion in 2014 and estimate that the market value could hit \$20 billion by 2019." (emphasis added)
